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ABOUT The Rite of Spring

Seeta Patel marries Indian classical dance and Western classical music in her *The Rite of Spring*, in a London premiere. Taking the South Indian classical dance form of bharatanatyam, with its intricate rhythmic footwork, geometric and dynamic movements and expressive prowess, Seeta Patel has created a compelling interpretation of the iconic *The Rite of Spring*.

Unusually, this version subverts tradition by choosing a male as The Chosen One, elevating him to a deity to whom all sacrifice themselves. This is a spiritual exploration of a work through an Eastern philosophical lens.

This is a rare chance to see bharatanatyam performed in an ensemble piece. As an added feature, Seeta Patel will open the evening's show with a solo performance accompanied by South Indian musicians, entitled Shree. The piece shows bharatanatyam as it is often presented in a solo format, and will take us on the journey of Mother Earth from birth to destruction, preparing us for Her deliverance through The Rite of Spring.

With Stravinsky's iconic score performed live by Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra and conductor Kirill Karabits, this is a Rite of Spring, but not as you know it.

ABOUT Bharatanatyam

BHARATANATYAM is a holistic and comprehensive dance form which is very expressive on many levels combining abstract movement and storytelling. Every single element of the body is used.

Originating from the Southern state of Tamil Nadu, this South Indian classical dance form shares two main components; Nritta the pure dance aspect, featuring the movements of the body, footwork, geometry, shapes and patterns. Abhinaya, the second component, is about the storytelling and expression through using face, body and hand gestures alongside its relationship to the poetry and music, which is the throughline across the whole dance form.



Choreographer's Note

Stepping into the world of Stravinsky's *Rite* of *Spring* is like walking into a calm, shallow, sun kissed pool, but feeling that there is something much bigger than anything you've ever known about to consume you. This brings anticipation, excitement and a strange sense of foreboding.

For me the first part of the work is like a game, no-one knows who the chaser is or who is being chased. But the excitement is palpable, the dancers still youthful and full of hope, being pushed and pulled by the energy around them. The music guides the pathways and patterns, be it as frantic searching, joyful play or reverent submission to a higher force. This part is mercurial, changing at every turn. Unexpected, never allowing you to rest in one place, and it is the same for the dancers. They give themselves to the violent yet energising ebb and flow of the music, mere servants to the power of nature.

I have chosen to split the two halves of the music with a short interlude that takes the form of an ethereal dream. A moment of calm that draws us for a fleeting breath into the mind of the Chosen One. A gentle, nurturing place that welcomes the Chosen One with warmth and love and strains of a magical voice. But we

soon realise that the hope of the Chosen One that their fate will be kind is just a dream. As Stravinsky's score enters the space again, we realise these hopes cannot be fulfilled.

As we follow the journey the Chosen One must take, there is a sense of fate and duty, an inevitability that the burden placed upon their shoulders must be fulfilled. The Chosen One, forbidden to choose, yet who must prove that they are worthy. The Sacrificed becomes the Divine unto whom we must all submit. The Mother, the Earth, the Goddess: Nature herself.

Stravinsky's score is a visceral, pulsating heart filled with the life force of the Earth and all who reside within her. It has been a humbling and exhausting experience creating this work, and it is my hope that with the power of Bharatanatyam coursing through mine and my dancers' veins has taken this iconic work to a new place with honesty and respect.

I dedicate this performance in loving memory of my late father Sureshbhai Rambhai Patel, and my late music teacher Bhagvatulu Seetarama Sharma Sir.

ABOUT Seeta Patel



The award-winning choreographer and dancer Seeta Patel was born in London and began her training under the guidance of Kiran Ratna in 1990. She has since worked with a range of Bharatanatyam and contemporary dance

professionals including Mavin Khoo, Padma Shri Adyar K Lakshman, Pushkala Gopal and Darshan Singh Bhuller. She has also performed and toured with a number of companies such as DV8 Physical Theatre, Shobana Jeyasingh Dance Company, David Hughes Dance Company and Mavin Khoo Dance.

Seeta has presented solo and ensemble works at the Southbank Centre Purcell Room, Royal Opera House, ROH2 and Sadler's Wells such as: Cycle of Change (2005), She Was Still (2005-6), Alter Ego (2007), Shringara (2009), Last One Standing (2010) and First Light (2014). Her solo classical London debut, Shringara: Journey of Desire, was performed to a capacity audience at The Clore Upstairs, Royal Opera House (June 2009), and then toured around the UK in 2010/11. She subsequently presented solo classical works Dancing My Siva and Something Then, Something Now to sold out audiences at Sadler's Wells and the Purcell Room (Darbar Festival).

Over the past 20 years, Patel has received numerous awards and bursaries for her creative and professional development. She was awarded the Lisa Ullmann Travel Scholarship to study in India (2005) and at the New York Film Academy (2013). In 2017, she received the Washington S&R Award for her work championing Bharatanatyam in the diaspora.

Seeta worked as a choreographic collaborator with the world renowned contemporary circus company, Gandini Juggling, for their production Sigma which premiered at the Edinburgh Fringe in 2017 before touring in 2020 and subsequently won the Archangel Award, Total Theatre Award, and Asian Arts Award.

In tandem with her choreographic and performing work Seeta has worked in film, TV and theatre. She produced a multi awardwinning short dance film, The Art of Defining Me in 2013, which gained national and international acclaim. She was a judge, mentor and advisor for the inaugural BBC TV Young Dancer Competition and in 2016 choreographed a new play at the Theatre Royal Stratford East entitled The House of In Between.

Seeta's contemporary work in collaboration with the Australian choreographer and performer Lina Limosani is the one-woman show, Not Today's Yesterday which takes a dramatic look at the whitewashing of history around the world. The show was a recipient of the Adelaide Artist Fringe Fund and premiered successfully at the Adelaide Fringe Festival in 2018 where it won Best Dance, and the Peace Foundation Award. The production toured around the UK in 2018 and 2019, including the Edinburgh Fringe as part of the British Council showcase. During the tour Seeta curated a series of lively and interesting post-show talks in association with a range of activists, historians and artists. The work went on to tour internationally including Australia, India, Italy and Egypt.

Most recently, Seeta Patel's critically acclaimed Bharatanatyam version of the iconic ballet, The Rite of Spring, toured the UK through 2019-2021, winning the 2020 Eastern Eye Arts, Culture and Theatre Award in the Dance Category and being nominated for best stage production by the Asian Media Group in 2019. The work is currently being developed with an extended cast and full orchestra for a performance run throughout 2023.

The constantly evolving world of South Asian Dance is developing as an integral part of the international dance landscape and Seeta Patel is a vital part of this growing business; she mentors and supports up-and-coming dancers and produces high quality work which entertains and engages an increasing audience both in the UK and abroad.

ABOUT Kirill Karabits (Chief Conductor)



Kirill Karabits has been Chief Conductor of the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra for 14 years and their relationship has been celebrated worldwide. Together they have made many critically acclaimed recordings, performed regularly at the BBC Proms and appeared together at London's Barbican Centre as part of the Beethoven celebrations in the 19-20 season.

Karabits has worked with many of the leading ensembles of Europe, Asia and North America, including the Cleveland, Philadelphia, San Francisco and Chicago Symphony orchestras, Munich Philharmonic, Orchestre National de France, Philharmonia Orchestra, Wiener Symphoniker, Rotterdam Philharmonic, Yomiuri Nippon Symphony Orchestra, Orchestra Filarmonica del Teatro La Fenice and the BBC Symphony Orchestra – including a concertante version of Bluebeard's Castle at the Barbican Centre.

Recent highlights include Kirill's debuts with the Dallas Symphony, Pittsburgh Symphony, Baltimore Symphony, and the Prague RadioSymphony, as well as return visits to the Minnesota Orchestra, Bamberger Symphoniker, Orchestre National Captiole de Toulouse, Antwerp Symphony Orchestra, Orchestre Philharmonique de Strasbourg, and the Opéra Montpellier for a production of Pélléas, as well as the BBCProms with the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra.

Kirill has also recently enjoyed conducting at the Edinburgh Festival and joining Mikhail Pletnev on extensive European and North American tours whichincluded his New York debut at the Lincoln Center. Highlights of the 2022-23 season include Kirill's return to the English National Opera for a production of Die tote Stadt, to Opernhaus Zürich for La Boheme, and to The Grange Festival for Così fan tutte. This season sees Kirill perform with Opéra National de Bordeaux, Orchestre National de Montpellier, Polish National Radio Symphony Orchestra in Katowice, and embark on an extensive Korean Tour conducting the Chamber Orchestra of Europe.

A prolific opera conductor, Karabits has worked with the Deutsche Oper, Opernhaus Zürich (Boris Godunov) and Oper Stuttgart (Death in Venice), Glyndebourne Festival Opera (La bohème and Eugene Onegin), Staatsoper Hamburg (Madama Butterfly), English National Opera (Don Giovanni), Bolshoi Theatre and he conducted a performance of Der fliegende Holländer at the Wagner Geneva Festival in celebration of the composer's anniversary.

Music Director of the Deutsches Nationaltheatre Weimar from 2016-19, Karabits conducted acclaimed productions of Wagner's Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg and Tannhäuser as well as Mozart's DaPonte Cycle (Le nozze di Figaro, Don Giovanni, and Così fan tutte).

Working with the next generation of bright musicians is of great importance to Karabits and as Artistic Director of I, CULTURE Orchestra he conducted them on their European tour in August 2015 with Lisa Batiashvili as soloist and a summer festivals tour in 2018, including concerts at the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam and the Montpellier Festival. In 2012 and 2014 he conducted the televised finals of the BBC Young Musician of the Year Award (working with the Royal Northern Sinfonia and BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra), and has recently debuted with the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain on a UK tour including a sold out and critically acclaimed performance at the Barbican. Kirill was named Conductor of the Year at the 2013 Royal Philharmonic Society Music Awards.

Sarveshan Gangen



K Sarveshan is a South African Bharatanatyam artiste of Indian Origin. His performance practice rigorously explores the complexities of his diasporic cultural heritage and his

embodied experience. Sarveshan's distinct understanding of Bharatanatyam is derived from his initial training with Savitri Naidoo, student of the formidable Pandanallur Srinivasa Pillai and Indira Rajan, and his expert training received from Natyaacharya Shanta and V.P Dhananjayan. Even though Sarveshan is a seasoned Bharatanatyam performer, he continues to explore dance research and scholarship, with a first-class BA Honours in Performance Studies from The University of Cape Town (2021).

In 2018, The Madras Music Academy awarded Sarveshan the "Gutty Vasu Endowment Prize" for being the "Best Performer" at the Spirit of Youth Festival 2017. Other titles that have been conferred on him are "Natya Purna" from Bharata Kalanjali, "Natya Bhaarathi" from Visakha Art & Dance Association & "Yuva Kalaa Bhaarathi" from Bhaarat Kalaachaar. He is the 2021-2022 recipient of The Kalaavahini Junior Fellowship for which he created and premiered his recent work KailāsaKrishna.

Sarah Sangeetha is a professional dancer trained in Bharatanatyam, Western Contemporary Dance, Ballet and Martial Arts from Switzerland.

During several years

Holding a Bachelor of Arts diploma in Music & Movement of Music University Zurich, Sarah had intense training in Western Classical Music & Composing, as well as in contemporary dance.

He is currently continuing his training under the guidance of Sri. Sheejith Krishna of The Sahrdaya Foundation, Chennai. Performance credits include Vancouver 2010 Olympics, Sanctuary Season 2, Karl Wolfe, a short movie with choreographer Jae Blaze, the productions Ganga and Kaal – Time by the Janak Khendry Dance Company (Kuwait, Oman, India), the 2017 Toronto International Dance Festival, the 2017 Kalanidhi Festival, Howzat! by Sampradaya Dance Creations, Ms. Leela Samson's Nadi with Spanda Dance Company, Seeta Patel's The Rite of Spring (UK), and the movie New Monuments by Director X.

Nidhaga Karunad B M is a captivating performer who has won the hearts of audiences around the nation. The initial training in YAKSHAGANA under Guru Sri Srinivasa Sastan of Karnataka

Kala Darshini, Bangalore and several performances of that theatrical art sparked him to pursue the complex dance art of bharatanatyam. Thus began his training under Karnataka Kalashree Guru Smt Dr. Suparna Venkatesh at Sai Arts International, Bangalore. Nidhaga rapidly within a span of five years, understood the nuances of the

South Indian Dance form and readied himself to professionally perform, principally for the spiritual elation one gets during dancing and then to share that bliss with the prekshaka. Nidhaga's performances across the country and his presentations in China and Nepal have been appreciated and applauded. His Portrayal of characters in Dance features of reputed choreographers and producers is highly prized especially in productions of Sai Arts International, Articulate India, Abhinava Dance Company and Punyah Dance Company. Nidhaga is an Empanelled artist of ICCR in Bharatanatyam, he is a Graded artist at Doordarshan in Bharatanatyam and Kathak, Scholarship holder from Karnataka Sangeeta Nritya Academy.

He ventured into ballet and contemporary dance late at the age of 21 under Umesh Shetty who is the reason he fell in love with dance. After araduating in 2013 with a Diploma in dance he debuted himself as a solo Bharatanatyam dancer at the Temple of Fine Arts International under the guidance of Shankar Kandasamy.

He has performed extensively in Australia and Europe. His recent productions include Ravana choreographed by Mavin Khoo at the Darbar Festival, Sadler Wells Theatre, London (2019) and Shantanand Festival of the Arts at the Temple of Fine Arts Kuala Lumpur (2022). Currently an artist with InnerSpace Dance Company, a part-time lecturer at ASWARA, and a teacher at Temple of Fine Arts Kuala Lumpur, Kishore is in constant search of movement and is developing his own way of moving through the accumulation of his learning experiences. He loves the contrast between speed, breath, stillness and animalistic movements.

Indu started her education in Bharatanatyam in the Netherlands at a young age which she

Indu's passion for the classical arts brought her to Kathak in 2013, when she started training under her gurus Sri Hari and Smt. Chethana Hari from Bangalore, India.

Indu has collaborated with several internationally acclaimed dancers and choreographers. In the past years she has performed in both classical and contemporary Indian dance productions, led by different choreographers, such as Kalpana Raghuraman, Sri Hari and Smt. Chethana Hari, Seeta Patel, Subhatra Subramaniam, Kenzo Kusuda. Indu has toured nationally and internationally with these productions.

Shree Savani



designer in Venice at

contemporary dance. In 2012, he won the audience prize of the GD'A Veneto competition.

In 2013 his Bharatanatyam solo debut was presented by Mavin Khoo in Venice, and the same year he performed in India under the guidance of Seetharama Sharma. Since then, he has performed several solo shows in India and Europe. In 2012 and 2013 he was invited to be a guest lecturer by the Theatre Department of the University of Malta, to teach a lighting design course. In 2018 he obtained an MA in 'Performing Arts – Dance' with a dissertation on multi-genre choreographies that merge Indian classical dance and contemporary dance.
