NYDC isn't just a dance programme to me. It's a community, a place where I feel supported and inspired.

India Hurley

Going to the first workshop in my hometown (Blackpool) was very scary as I had to show 'me'. When I got the call inviting me to the final audition in London I was thrilled but also thinking to myself 'okay, how and what do I do?' I thought about the audition every second in the lead up to it, and when it came to it, I just did 'me'. It was intense finding out if I had been selected, but when I got that email I was so happy and had to get a screenshot. I had done it! I was going to be in the room working with two big companies that I'd seen on stage and on social media, and this time it would be me on stage as well! Orson Crane

As someone who started my dance training only a year ago, the prospect of working with and performing a piece by an award winning company like Boy Blue felt – and still feels – incredibly daunting. On top of this, the NYDC cohort is made up of 33 extremely talented individuals, all with their own ways of processing, regulating and working. Navigating a new social dynamic is just as challenging for me as the actual dancing itself, but I have been able learn from my peers, whilst also learning a lot about how I like to work in the space and what I need in order to thrive. This has helped to shape me into the artist I'm continually developing and growing into.

Nya Stewart

I could feel the nerves in the air as I stepped onto the coach, quiet words floating out of our mouths and shy smiles slipping around our faces. In a crescendo, our voices grew louder and louder; you would have thought everyone had known each other for ages by the time we got off. Getting to know one another was inevitable after we played 'big booty' – surprisingly, a number game! Eating together and living together over those first four days was a new experience for me, bringing us all closer together.

India Hurley

When I dance, I want to express and explore human emotions through movement and that is exactly the space that NYDC holds for me. Kenrick, Mikey, Lara and Nathaniel encourage us to sit in what is uncomfortable, to let your inner child lead and to lean into the unknown. This felt risky to begin with as it felt too open, too wide, but I quicky learnt to give myself grace to explore and create. Don't get me wrong, I am still finding my feet in hip hop, but everything doesn't feel like a massive shock anymore. I have learnt that not everything you do will be in your comfort zone and that you need to trust the process even if you can't see how it will turn out. My training in classical styles has been welcomed, championed and celebrated, which has not always been my story as a male ballet dancer amongst my non-dancing male peers.

Zak Michael Kwaku Smith

Despite being a dance company, being a part of NYDC means so much more than just being a dancer and performing on stage. I remember something Kenrick explained in the first residency that really stuck with me: your presence is valued in the space. Whether you move or not, whether you dance or not. Since then I have used this as a mantra for when things feel a little tough, both in and out of the studio.

NYDC 2024/25 Guest Artistic Directors: Boy Blue


Founded in east London, 2001 by composer Michael 'Mikey J' Asante, MBE and choreographer Kenrick 'H2O' Sandy, MBE, Boy Blue is the radical force that has defined the potential and power of hip-hop dance theatre across the UK since starting out.

Shaped by a multi-generational, multicultural community with seven regular companies ranging in age from 5 to 40+, Boy Blue's achievements and accolades are as far-reaching as the community it has fostered and the hip-hop culture it has elevated. Some call Boy Blue a family, others, a nation, with most hip-hop dancers having called it home at some point of their careers.



Kenrick 'H2O' Sandy Choreographer & Co Guest Artistic Director for NYDC

Kenrick 'H2O' Sandy is a visionary force in the world of dance and the co-founder and co-Artistic Director of Boy Blue. Renowned as one of the most influential choreographers of his generation, Sandy has redefined the boundaries of hip hop dance through his groundbreaking works, including the Olivier Award-winning Pied Piper: A Hip-Hop Dance Revolution (2006), the powerful Blak Whyte Gray (2017), REDD (2019) and the highly acclaimed CYCLES (2024). Sandy's artistry transcends the stage; his collaboration with director Danny Boyle for the London 2012 Olympic Opening Ceremony won the Evening Standard's Beyond Theatre award, a testament to his innovative approach. In 2023, he choreographed the spectacular Free Your Mind at Manchester's Aviva Studios, further showcasing the power of hip hop as a compelling storytelling medium. His impressive screen credits include T2 Trainspotting, Street Dance 3D, and high-profile events like the BAFTAs, MOBO Awards, and Brit Awards. Sandy has also choreographed for artists such as FKA twigs, Rita Ora, and brands like Nike and Adidas. Recognised with an MBE in 2017 for his exceptional contributions to dance and the community, he is dedicated to nurturing the next generation of talent, inspiring students to discover their unique voices and become some of the UK's top street dancers.



Michael 'Mikey J' Asante
Composer & Co Guest Artistic Director for NYDC

Michael 'Mikey J' Asante is co-founder and co-artistic director of Boy Blue, founded in 2001, who are Olivier Award-winning associate artists at the Barbican, where Asante is also a board member. As a music producer, Asante has a diverse discography catalogue, creating music for television, film and theatre. Asante mentors and delivers masterclasses in directing, choreography, and music. He is a professor of electronic music at Guildhall School of Music, where he was awarded an Honorary Fellowship (HonFGS) in 2018. Asante's theatre credits include The Effect at the National Theatre as well as Free Your Mind at the Aviva Studios, Tree at the Young Vic, and Blak Whyte Gray at the Barbican. Other credits include, for television: Criminal Record for Apple TV and collaboration with Brian Eno for the soundtrack on Top Boy; and film: Kneecap. In 2022, Asante was awarded an MBE for services to hip hop dance and music in the Queen's New Year Honours list.

Adam Carrée Lighting Designer

Adam is excited to be returning to light the NYDC piece this year and collaborate with Boy Blue. He graduated with a degree in Lighting Design from Rose Bruford Collage. Since then he has gone on to work with and design for Sidi Larbi Cherkaoui (Sutra, Puzzle, 4D, Milonga, Babel, Faun and Play), Shobana Jeyasingh (Staging Schiele), Botis Seva (Madhead), Alesandra Seutin (Paradis Quartier and Speak Volumes), Natalia Osipova (Ave Maria, Once With and Valse Triste), Ivan Blackstock (Harlem Dreams) and Mark Brew (An Accident/A life). Adam is also currently the Head of Production for Sadler's Wells in London.



Ryan Dawson Laight Costume Designer

Ryan is a set and costume designer whose work has been seen across plays, musical theatre and dance. He was nominated for the Olivier Award for Best Costume Design for La Cage aux Folles at Regent's Park Open Air Theatre, for which he also won the WhatsOnStage Award for Best Costume Design.



Nathaniel SB Impraim-Jones is Rehearsal Director/Commercial Manager for Boy Blue. Nathaniel has been a member of Boy Blue for 18 years as a dancer, teacher and facilitator. Mentored by Kenrick 'H2O' Sandy & Michael 'Mikey J' Asante, Nathaniel has worked as Boy Blue's Rehearsal Director on productions such as Blak Whyte Gray (2016-22), REDD (2019), Free Your Mind (2023) and Cycles (2024) touring throughout the globe from London to New York.

He is also one of the leading industry dancers to have extensively worked in the Commercial Scene with Artists such as; Beyonce & Jay-Z, Jason Derulo, Rita Ora, Kelly Rowland, Whitney Houston, Stormzy, Dave, Anne Marie, Jesy Nelson, Mabel. He also has performed on TV shows such as ITV's The X Factor, and BBC 1's So You Think You Can Dance, Strictly Come Dancing and The Greatest Dancer.



Lara Rose McCabe
Rehearsal Director

Lara's background in dance started in musical theatre and contemporary. She later moved into street dance genres and, after joining Boy Blue in 2012, continued to develop as both an artist and a choreographer, bringing her opportunities to perform in many major company shows, including Emancipation of Expressionism with Danny Boyle, and as Resident and Rehearsal Director on Free Your Mind with Danny Boyle and Boy Blue.

Lara's professional work has seen her involved in campaigns with Nike, Adidas, and KFC, as well as the London Olympic ceremonies, Latitude and Wilderness Festivals. She has ventured further into choreography and worked as a movement director for a range of artists, including Alex Aiono, MAVRO Studios, and The Power of Musik with CeCe Sammy. Additionally, she was Associate Choreographer for Three Billy Goats at the Unicorn Theatre. Lara has also assisted and performed for artists such as Krept and Konan, Anne-Marie, Alice Chater, and on the BAFTA award-winning series Mood, as well as on projects with ITV and the BBC.



Eleanor Grace HannGravity Film: Director and Producer

Eleanor is an award winning director from South East London. She trained as a dancer at the BRIT School, Liverpool Institute for Performing Arts and London Contemporary Dance School. She was a member of NYDC from 2015-16 working with choreographer Damien Jalet. Throughout training she knew she wanted to be a creative, yet lacked confidence and inspiration due to the lack of women in these roles to look up to. Now as a director it is integral to her work to create change and include as many women and marginalised communities as possible in her crew and creative teams. Her credits include working with brands such as Nike, Pull and Bear, VEVO and Football Beyond Borders, and with artists like Odeal, London Grammar, King Promise, D Double E, Central Cee, Good Neighbours, Empara Mi.

Eleanor still teaches contemporary dance at Arts Educational School and the BRIT School, along with yoga across South London. She believes in the power of movement as a gift, and aims to make movement accessible to all.

Dylan is a hip hop dancer from Blackpool and trains with House of Wingz. He says that his relationship to dance has kept him grounded and allowed him to connect with himself and the world around him. Dylan describes dance as bringing him a sense of healing through expression and hopes to one day become a choreographer making his own work. "NYDC has helped me solidify my passion for dance and the love I feel for the culture of hip hop. I will forever be grateful for the experience this company has bought to me".


